


Medicinal Plants Research Internship

The students designed and carried out their own experiments to test their hypothesis, and they analyzed and interpreted their data with limited intervention from


the facilitators. The Internship concluded with student poster presentations on Friday, June 21, at the Skeen Hall Rotunda.

She traveled to several neighboring schools including Valladolid, Yucatán, where children speak both Mayan and Spanish (pictured below).



In her free time, Maria was able to explore the wonders of the Yucatan, such as the Mayan stepped pyramid of Kukulkan, El Castillo (pictured to right). The pyramid was built as a temple to worship the Mayan feathered serpent deity, Kukulkan. In the spring and autumn equinoxes, the late afternoon sun casts triangular shadows along the northwest



balustrade, which create the illusion of a feathered serpent crawling down the pyramid. She also had the opportunity to visit a natural sinkhole in the Yucatan named Cenote Xkeken. Filled with clear blue, green, azure colored water these beautiful sinkholes were once thought to be the gateway to the underworld. She enjoyed her time abroad, and looks forward to graduating this Fall 2019

with a bachelor's degree in Early Childhood


