Mariana is currently serving as a COMPA for the 19th CAMP Cohort, and her wisdom and experience is a great asset to the CAMP Team.



Staying Safe During the Pandemic

It is critical to the success of NMSU in these times that everyone understands the facts about COVID-19 and the role that every student, faculty, staff, and community member plays in protecting the health and safety of our NMSU community.

To minimize the risk to public health presented by the spread of COVID-19 while working and learning at NMSU, students, staff, and faculty are expected to adhere to the following:
