

Editors' Message



"MARIPOSAS CAMPESINAS"

This art installation stemmed from the 2021 16th Annual J. Paul Taylor Social Justice Symposium, "Justice for Farmworkers." In March 2021, J. Paul Taylor Academy students and the NMSU CAMP Student Council invited community members from the borderlands and beyond to make butterfly paper templates, and to write letters of hope, respect, and appreciation to local farmworkers by honoring them through art. The "Mariposas Campesinas" art installation was created by local artist, former farmworker, and NMSU CAMP student, Jesus del Río. The final phase of this project consists of CAMP students and staff distributing these butterflies to farmworkers across Southern New Mexico's agricultural fields to honor them for their dignified labor. These events were in partnership with the NMSU College Assistance Migrant Program (CAMP), the NMSU CAMP Student Council, the J. Paul Taylor Academy, and NMSU College of Arts and Sciences.

Sandra Martínez from Deming, NM, is a CAMP Alumna who received her Bachelor of Fine Arts in Painting in Fall of 2014. OUTSTANDING GRADUATE!

Zaira Martin graduated with a 3.9 GPA from four different departments in the College of Arts and Sciences: Government; Gender and Sexuality Studies; Criminal Justice; and Spanish. As a member of the Dean's List, she has won multiple academic excellence awards. Zaira has worked on a National Science Foundation grant, and presented original research papers at a regional academic conference including poster presentations at an NSF Research Symposium, while also participating in several community presentations. She is continuing research as an undergraduate on migration and settlement trends in Southern Mexico. Currently, Zaira is doing fieldwork this summer in a migrant shelter near the Mexico-Guatemala border. Upon completing her MA in Anthropology, she also plans to apply to a Ph.D. program to continue doing research on migration.

Zaira has written annotated bibliographies and has been involved with the research process with her professors and mentors, Cynthia Bejarano and Mary Alice Scott. In addition to her research, she has also helped to plan symposiums for the College of Arts & Sciences and the College Assistance Migrant Program Student Council (CAMP). For this year's College of Arts & Sciences J. Paul Taylor Social Justice Symposium, "Justice for Farmworkers," she served as a moderator for a Health Disparities and Food Insecurities panel. After graduating, Zaira plans to give back to her community by engaging in advocacy efforts on issues that impact the region.

She states that, "as a border community, we have issues that impact us directly and often get overlooked. For this reason, it is important to bring light to those issues to improve the community". As a CAMP Alumna, Zaira notes, " CAMP has been instrumental in both my education and personal development. Since the day I walked through the CAMP doors as a freshman, CAMP has been a family away from home and has provided me with...

incredible opportunities and lifelong relationships."





Research & Internship Experiences

Agriculture has continued to be a part of CAMP student's lives when they come to NMSU. In the early years of CAMP, the Agricultural Science Summer Undergraduate Research Education and Development (ASSURED) program, overseen by Dr. Paul Bosland and the Chile Pepper Institute involved underrepresented students in agricultural science research using chile peppers as the main crop of investigation. Currently, the CAMP Medicinal Plants Summer Research Internship, gives CAMP students the opportunity to conduct research on the medicinal properties of the plant of their choice. A warm thank you to Dr. Laura Rodriguez-Uribe for overseeing the program for many years and guiding students into having a robust research experience at NMSU.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Medicinal Plants Research Internship was halted in 2020, but it had a strong start in the summer of 2021 with seven sophomores and one junior participating. This experience helped students to meet in person and have a more hands-on experience after navigating through 2020-2021 online college year. Three of the students involved are majoring in Nursing (Brenda Carrasco, Yamilet Carranza & Fatima Oliveros), one in Social Work (Karina Ramirez), one in Business Administration (Sheyla Gutierrez), one in Mechanical and Aerospace Engineering (Emilio Serrano), and one in Economics (Kevin Almaraz).

Apart from the medicinal plants program, CAMP also partners over the summer, with the College of Engineering for a second STEM internship, the Bridge Inspection Program. The CAMP engineering student leaves the six-week program certified as a bridge inspector.

In fiscal year 2022, CAMP received state funding to create the CAMP Internship Program allowing for a minimum of 10 paid internships throughout the academic year. CAMP interns are placed with community partners to develop skills for their future careers.

Dr. Cynthia Bejarano



NMSU CAMP was first founded in the fall of 2002. As the Principal Investigator, it was a mad scramble to establish the program, hire staff, set up accounts and recruit students, only days before the fall semester began! For most of fall 2002, my graduate assistant, Magnolia Carlos and I recruited from local schools and registrar's lists, picking up the phone, and asking freshmen if they had experience in farm work. We did this while I taught a regular teaching load and Magnolia took her graduate courses. Mid-semester, we had a breakthrough when identifying the Santiago family by Representative Raymundo Lara, who at that time worked at the Gadsden Independent School District with federal programs. By late fall, we identified seven students and we hired a Program Director, Mary Luján, and a recruiter, Larry Salazar.

Now, twenty years later, we can proudly say we have served over 560 students. Back then, we each went from occupying a corner of my faculty office desk and sharing one landline, to four converted dormitories that staff and students shared, to our current 1,800 square foot office. Our Program Director and former Advisor, Martha Estrada, our Recruiter and former CAMPer,

Ricardo Trejo, our Freshmen Advisor, Yvette Cortez, our Administrative Assistant, Cynthia Bartow, and our newest colleague, Francisco Soto (Retention Advisor) share this space with our CAMPers building community and our CAMP familia. Our evaluators, Cathilia Flores (may she rest in peace) and Dr. Michelle Valverde, guided us throughout these years. Today, our Statistician, Judy Bosland, along with our student research team, ensure that we are collecting, organizing, and analyzing our data and remaining on top of our programming.

Our team has grown to six student staff, five COMPAS (peer mentors), and five CAMP Ambassadors (please check out our website), and a dedicated group of support staff from every corner of the University that help make our students and program successful. NMSU CAMP has been blessed with people dedicated to its mission to serve farm working families, driven by a passion to transform the lives of students, as they have transformed our lives for the better.
