

First Annual Southwest HEP/CAMP Student Leadership Conference: Growing Leaders for the Future

There had always been talk about possible ways of getting CAMP students from around the region together. Thanks to the hard work of HEP and CAMP programs from New Mexico and Colorado, this vision finally became a reality. This past February, NMSU CAMP took nine students to participate in the first-ever Southwest HEP/CAMP Student Leadership Conference held at the University of New Mexico campus in Albuquerque. Other CAMP programs from UNM and the University of Colorado-Boulder participated as well as students from the High School Equivalency Program (HEP) from UNM and Northern New Mexico Community College.

Workshop topics ranged from understanding the importance of minority participation in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) careers to learning what it takes to be a leader on campus and within our communities. The conference was designed to encourage continued participation in student organizations and having a voice on campus. It allowed participants to network with CAMP students from other institutions. Attendees recognized that other college students have shared experiences within their personal and academic lives.

When asked about the event, Sandra Martinez, a sophomore, said, "It was a good experience. I'm looking forward to having the conference at the NMSU campus." Indeed that is the goal—to continue collaborating with other HEP/CAMP programs to offer new initiatives and opportunities for our students.

The Road to Leadership



Since 2009 NMSU CAMP has been sending students to the Bert Corona Leadership Institute (BCLI) in Washington, DC. Sophomores, Alma Hernández and Flor Ogaz, were picked to represent NMSU CAMP at the 2010 BCLI training which was held July 19 -24. The goal of the week-long training is to empower students from farm working, immigrant and underdeveloped communities to learn about the democratic process as well as engaging in grass roots development. "We came up with issues that were concerning our state, like teen pregnancy in New Mexico," stated Flor. The students were partnered with other CAMP students from around the nation, tackling other issues such as the Dream Act. Alma enjoyed learning about new perspectives. She said, "I saw other opinions and attitudes on both sides of the issues." After the intense training, participants spoke with members of Congress on Capital Hill. Flor expressed how the BCLI experience empowered

her to be a contributor to the democratic process, "We met with CAMPers from around the nation. It made me realize that legislators are doing a good job, but I hope they don't forget about the migrant community because there are a lot of farm working students that want the opportunity to attend college." Both Alma and Flor share the same enthusiasm of what they learned and took from BCLI. Moreover, the CAMPers left with an understanding of social change. Alma reflected, "Don't doubt your cause. If you're really going to fight for it, then *really* fight for it!"

Researching in South America

Hard work and persistence have definitely paid off for Daniel "Danny" Ramirez. A CAMPer and Ph.D. student in Biology, Danny has started to enjoy the benefits of his rigorous research. On November 2, 2010, Danny departed for Santiago, Chile to attend a short course titled, Concepts and Model Organisms in Regenerative Biology. The satellite course was the 5th International Meeting of the

Latin American Society for Developmental Biology. The purpose of the conference was practicing regeneration and how it could potentially be beneficial for Parkinson disease. His mentor, Dr. Elba Serrano, approached him with the opportunity and financial assistance was provided by the National Science Foundation. Danny always had an interest in attending a conference in Latin America and this was the perfect opportunity for him to accomplish this goal. Being able to collaborate internationally was key for Danny, "I want to start collaborating with professionals in Latin America

because they know things we might not know." This opportunity also allowed him to network at the international level and to understand how research is conducted outside of the United States. He also states, "The more people you know, the better chances you have of becoming a better scientist." He is staying true to this idea and will be conducting research at Harvard this summer. Way to go, Danny!


